
However:



In California, an estimated 175,000 middle and high school-age students co-use marijuana and tobacco products (this includes vaping)^{3,4}

Californians use tobacco products, which exceeds the total population of 23 states^{1,2}

Approximately 4.1 million

In California, an estimated 213,000 high school students vape^{3,4}



One in ten young adults age 18-29 years vape¹



Each California adult pays \$103 per person to treat tobacco-related diseases through supporting Medi-Cal⁵
