




A. Clue: This city is 9th largest in California and boasts more Basque eateries than any other city in the nation.

B. Clue: This site is home to FedEx, IBM, AT&T, Nestle, New York Life, and 540+ other tenant companies in more than 30 industries.

C. Clue: Once home to B-52 bombers, this site is now home to eighteen holes among trees and rare fairy shrimp in vernal pools.

D. Clue: This town has a long history of wine and healing waters: grapes were introduced in 1797 and visitors have come for springs and mud baths as far back as 1795.




E. Clue: Home to the Karuk Tribe since the beginning of history, today this place hosts the Bigfoot Jamboree every Labor Day weekend.

F. Clue: The structure atop here is named for a wealthy and eccentric patron of firefighters and the area itself is known for its raucous winged residents.

G. Clue: From \$1.25 per acre of land in 1869 to nearly \$2,000,000 by 2000, this city has a rich real estate history (at times, marred by discrimination). Today, it is home to a university and several highly regarded research institutions.

H. Clue: More than 700 caves, Native American rock art sites, historic battlefields and campsites, and a high desert wilderness experience await you at this site.



I. Clue: This entertainment site is known for housing four professional sports teams and having seen the likes of Al Gore, Garth Brooks, and Evan Lysacek.

J. Clue: Something very exciting, charged, electric, and totally amped up happened here on June 22, 2012. What a different experience from item K in this quiz...

K. Clue: The opening of the powerhouse, built by H.P. Livermore here, featured a "grand electric carnival" parade and a 100-gun salute. The control switchboard, faced with Tennessee marble, is still around today.

L. Clue: The south slope of this mountain is covered with black obsidian, a grove of ancient maul oaks near the summit dates back more than 500 years, and nearby vineyards thrive in the volcanic soil.
