



Adolescent Sexual and Reproductive Health, Amador County, 2013



Adolescence is the developmental period from ages 10 to 19. During adolescence and into early adulthood, the brain undergoes the last major period of growth and reorganization, resulting in an increased need for stimulation and changes in social and emotional information processing. Adolescence is a time for youth to explore their identity and values. Often this occurs in the context of peer relationships though parents and other adult figures remain influential. Although the morbidity and mortality rates increase sharply from childhood through adolescence, most youth fare well. Adolescence is a critical time for establishing patterns for a positive adulthood - including an active role in one's reproductive and sexual health.



Adolescent Births In Amador County

- Fewer than 30 adolescent births occurred in Amador County in 2013.
- The adolescent birth rate has decreased 72.6% since 2003; the state decreased 58.9% over the same period.
- Since 2003, there have been too few births per year, and across multiple year periods, to produce reliable birth rate data for adolescents aged 15-17 in Sierra County.
- 11.8% of adolescent births in Amador County were to mothers who reported a Hispanic ethnicity. The state average was 74.9%.
- 76.5% of adolescent births in Amador County were to mothers who reported a White race. The state average was 11.7%.
