



Current and Future Health and Social Services Professionals Trained and Educated by the CADCs:




The CADCs Trained and Educated an Estimated 40,747 Caregivers, Family Members, and Community Members.




Caregivers, Family Members, and Community Members Trained, Educated, and Supported by the CADCs:

Professional Training and Education Activities:

CME Courses

Continuing Medical Education (CME) is required for professional development or continued licensing or certification and which is presented by the CADC. These activities may include training/education courses for nurses, social workers, physicians, psychologists or similar professional disciplines that require ongoing training for continuation within the profession.

In-service Training

In-service Training includes training to formal (i.e. paid) health and social service providers (e.g. nurses, social workers, psychologists, physicians, nurses aides, etc.) on topics related to CADC activities. An example of such activity would be in-service training on the management of Alzheimer's disease patients to nursing home staff, adult day care center staff or for those who will train caregivers in the management of symptoms.

Presentations to Professional Groups

Professional groups include local medical societies, professional organizations, service provider groups, professional societies, professional symposiums, etc.

Fellowships/Residencies/Internships

The activities classified under this category include formal programs that have been established to provide practical training associated with the tasks students/fellows will encounter in their professional careers. Examples of such activities include medical specialty residencies and internships (e.g. internal medicine, psychiatry, neurology, family practice, etc.), fellowships (e.g. psychology, neurology, psychiatry, etc.), graduate and undergraduate student internships, etc.

Rotations/Clerkships

The activities classified under this category are those generally of shorter duration than activities classified under fellowships/residencies/internships but that have also been established to provide participants practical experience in a variety of clinical and/or professional settings. Examples of activities falling under this category include medical student rotations, pharmacy student rotations, advanced clerkships, etc.

Academic Classes

The activities classified in this category are those provided as part of the regular curriculum of an academic or professional school; classes taught wholly by CADC staff and directly related to CADC activities.

Academic Lectures

The activities classified in this category are those in which CADC staff is involved as guests to speak to classes that are given as part of a regular academic or professional school curriculum.

CADC-Organized Conferences

Activities in this category include conferences sponsored or co-sponsored by the CADC that utilize CADC-related activities as part of the conference content.

Presentations at Professional Conferences

Activities in this category include presentation of papers at professional conferences (local, state, national, or international) which report research or data associated with CADC activities.

Community Training and Education Activities:

Caregiver Training

Activities in this category include training to informal (i.e. unpaid) caregivers on topics related to caring for patients with Alzheimer's disease and related disorders. Examples of such activities include presentations regarding methods to manage patient disease symptoms provided to support groups sponsored by the Alzheimer's Association, or specialized caregiver training sessions sponsored by groups such as the Caregiver Resource Centers.

Support Group Presentations

Activities in this category include presentations to family support groups or to organizations such as the Caregiver Resource Centers on topics that are not directly concerned with caring for patients with Alzheimer's disease and related disorders. Examples of such presentations include updates on Alzheimer's disease research, characteristics of the disease, neurological aspects of the disease, financial and legal issues related to the disease, etc.

CADC-Developed Support Groups

Activities in this category include support groups run by the CADC for CADC patients and/or family members.

Presentations to Community Groups

Activities in this category include presentations to community groups that are not organized for the primary purpose of providing family support. Examples of such groups include Lions and Kiwanis Clubs, Masonic Lodges, and similar community service groups, business organizations, commissions on aging, legislative bodies, associations of retired persons, senior clubs and centers, retirement communities, health fairs, fundraising events, churches, volunteer programs, boards of supervisors, open houses, etc.
