

Suicide Death among Veterans in California, 2021



California Veterans (those who reside in California and have served in the United States Armed Forces) who died by suicide in 2021. It provides information on numbers of suicide deaths statewide broken down by age, sex, race/ethnicity, county, and method of suicide. Data are compiled from limited information on death certificates in the California Comprehensive Death Files produced by CDPH's Center for Health Statistics and Informatics.¹

In 2021, there were 559 suicide deaths among California residents aged 18 years and older who had served in the United States Armed Forces (identified here as Veterans) (Table 1).

- In 2021, due in part to the COVID-19 pandemic, the total number of deaths statewide increased by 4%. The number of deaths by suicide in 2021 increased by less than 1% statewide and decreased by 4% among California Veterans.
- 2021 had the lowest number of suicide deaths to California resident Veterans since the information became available in vital statistics data in 2005.
- Suicide deaths among Veterans made up 14% of all suicides in 2021 (compared to the 15% in 2019 and 2020).
- Among both Veterans and non-Veterans, suicides made up 1% of total deaths in 2021.




Figure 1: Age and Race/Ethnicity among Veteran suicide deaths, California residents aged 18 years and older, 2021 (n=559). American Indian/Alaska Native and Other/Unknown have been merged for data de-identification purposes.

Most Veteran suicide deaths were to males (96%; see Data Limitations section on page 3). Thirty-seven percent of Veteran suicides were in the 65–84 year-old age group, and 19% occurred in the 45-64 year-old age group. Fourteen percent of Veterans who died by suicide were in the oldest age group, 85 years and older. Most Veteran suicides were among Whites (76%) and Hispanics (11%) (Figure 1).




Figure 2: Method of suicide among Veteran suicide deaths, California residents aged 18 years and older, 2021 (n=559).

Firearms were used in nearly two-thirds of suicides among California Veterans (65%), followed by hanging/suffocation (19%) (Figure 2).

Females made up only 4% of Veteran suicide deaths; there may be some differences between male and female Veterans who die by suicide. In 2021, 15% of male Veteran suicides were among those aged 85 or older, whereas this age group had no suicide deaths among female Veterans (Table 2). Among both sexes, most suicides among Veterans were White (77% of males and 59% of females).

Firearms were used in most suicides among male Veterans (66%), followed by hanging/suffocation in 18% (Table 3). Hanging/suffocation, however, was used in almost one-third of female Veteran suicides, followed by firearm (27%) and poisoning (23%).

Los Angeles and San Diego, the two most populous counties in California, had the largest number of suicide deaths among Veterans in California, accounting for 25% in 2021 (Table 4).

Although overall suicide deaths decreased from 2020 to 2021, it is worth noting that suicide deaths increased from 109 to 136 (see Table 5) for Veterans between the ages of 25 and 44 years old. For the first time since 2018, Veterans between the ages of 25 and 44 years old have a greater number of suicide deaths compared to those between the ages of 45 to 64 years old. In addition, suicide deaths among Asian/Pacific Islander Veterans increased by 65% from 2020 to 2021 (from 20 to 33 deaths), making 2021 the third year of the past four that suicides among Asian/Pacific Islander Veterans has increased.

DATA LIMITATIONS

- In this report, Veteran status is identified based on the answer to a single item on the death certificate that asks whether the decedent was "ever in the United States Armed Forces." This does not distinguish between current and former service members, nor does it identify those seeing active duty. This definition of Veteran may not align with other definitions that include only those who have been activated for federal military service and are not serving at the time of their death.
- Rates were not calculated because CDPH does not have estimates on the underlying population of Californians who
 have served in the U.S. Armed Forces.
- The Veteran status information on death certificates may be inaccurate if those completing the form (e.g., Coroners, Funeral Homes) did not have sufficient information on the decedent's history.
- Sex is defined based on the sex that was assigned at birth or provided on the death certificate. Data available on death certificates does not yet include information on sexual orientation or gender identity.

TECHNICAL NOTES

Suicides are identified on the death certificate as an underlying cause of death with ICD-10 codes X60-X84, U03.0 or U03.9. Method of suicide is categorized by the following ICD-10 code groupings: Cut/Pierce: X78; Firearm: X72-X74; Hanging/suffocation: X70; Fall: X80; Poisoning: X60-X69; and Other: U03.0, U03.9, X71, X75-X77, X79, X81-X84.

As required by the California Department of Health Care Services, Data De-Identification Guidelines (DDG), Version 2.0, (November 22, 2016), small numbers may be masked in tables to prevent potential identification. In the case of county breakdowns, cells are masked when the number of deaths and the resident population are small.
