Dear Health Practitioner,

The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) under a cooperative agreement with the federal Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry (ATSDR), is currently conducting an investigation on the public health concerns associated with polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) at the Riverside Agricultural Park ("Ag Park"), located near Jurupa Avenue and Rutland Avenue in Riverside, CA. Residents in the Ag Park area have requested our assistance in providing their doctors with information about exposure to PCBs. This "Patient Information Package" is meant to give the community member and their health care provider information about PCBs and additional resources.

Community members who live near the Ag Park have voiced many concerns about health effects, including death, cancer, birth defects, skin rashes, skin lesions, asthma, autoimmune-disorders and others, from potential exposures to PCBs and other chemicals. We understand the difficulty in attributing environmental exposures to specific disease instances or non-specific symptoms and want to make you aware of online training courses available by the Centers for Disease Control and Health Promotion (CDC) aimed to help you better respond to your patients' PCB concerns environmental exposures, and evaluating your patient's environmental health concerns.
