Name Equality Act of 2007

This act gives specific rights to **one or both** California marriage license applicants at the time they are applying for a California marriage license to choose and list on the marriage license a new middle or last name that they will use after marriage.

Genetic conditions that can be passed down to children

Some health problems are passed down in families from parents to children through genes. They are called "genetic" conditions. You should know which genetic conditions are in your and your partner's family history if you plan to have children together. You can check for some genetic conditions and birth defects. During and after pregnancy

Pregnant individuals can get voluntary prenatal screening to check the health of their fetus for birth defects through the [California Prenatal Screening Program](http://www.cdph.ca.gov/PNS) (https://www.cdph.ca.gov/PNS). All California newborns receive routine screening for over 80 genetic conditions between 12 and 48 hours after birth through the [California Newborn Screening Program](http://www.cdph.ca.gov/NBS) (www.cdph.ca.gov/NBS).



Domestic violence is against the law

Domestic violence is more than just a disagreement. It is abusive behavior that can be physical, emotional, psychological, or sexual. Domestic violence is a pattern of behavior used to gain power and control over an intimate partner or spouse. Physical violence does not need to happen for a relationship to be abusive. HIV/AIDS facts

[CDPH's Office of AIDS](http://www.cdph.ca.gov/AIDS) (www.cdph.ca.gov/AIDS) provides comprehensive prevention, diagnosis, and treatment services for sexually transmitted diseases, viral hepatitis, tuberculosis, and HIV. HIV is the virus that causes HIV disease and AIDS. Everyone who has HIV has HIV disease, including people with AIDS. Drugs are available that can help people with HIV and AIDS live long and healthy lives.

HIV is passed through unsafe sex, contact with blood from a person infected with HIV, and drinking breast milk from a person infected with HIV. A person who has been infected with HIV may also pass it on to a baby during pregnancy or delivery. You can get a confidential HIV test from your doctor's office, clinic, or county health department.
