About the Data - Adolescent Mortality

Indicator Description

The adolescent mortality rate is the number of deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 10–19 years.

Data Analysis

The adolescent mortality rate shown in these dashboards is the number of deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 10–19 years who resided in California at the time of death, stratified by county, age, race/ethnicity, and sex. The distribution, or percent, of the leading causes of death is the number of adolescent deaths by stated cause among all adolescent deaths aged 10–19. The 95% confidence interval presented in the tooltips indicates there is a 95% chance that the range contains the true prevalence or rate in the population. Rates with wide confidence intervals should be interpreted with caution. The state dashboard uses single year data; the county dashboard uses three-year aggregated data.

Data Suppression

For adolescent mortality, the numerator, rate, and confidence interval are not shown when the numerator is less than 10.

For the distribution of leading causes of adolescent death, the numerator, denominator, rate, and confidence interval are not shown when the numerator or denominator is less than 10.

Category and Subcategory Definitions

Age: Age of decedent at time of death. Excludes records with unknown age.

Cause of death: The leading causes of adolescent death are defined based on International Classification of Diseases, 10th Revision (ICD-10) coding provided in the National Center for Health Statistics' List of 113 selected causes of death and Enterocolitis due to *Clostridium difficile* (Heron M. Deaths: Leading causes for 2019. National Vital Statistics Reports; vol 70 no 9. Hyattsville, MD: National Center for Health Statistics. 2021.). The following causes are shown in this dashboard: Malignant neoplasms (Cancer) (ICD-10 C00–C97); Congenital malformations, deformations, and chromosomal abnormalities (Congenital malformations) (ICD-10 Q00-Q99); Diseases of the heart (Heart disease) (ICD-10 I00–I09, I11, I13, I20–I51); Assault (Homicide) (*U01–*U02, ICD-10 X85–Y09, Y87.1); Intentional self-harm (Suicide) (*U03, ICD-10 X60–X84, Y87.0); Accidents (Unintentional injuries) (ICD-10 V01–X59, Y85–Y86); and All other causes. An asterisk (*) preceding a cause-of-death code indicates that the code is used only in the United States and not included in the International Classification of Diseases, 10th Revision (ICD-10).

Geography: State or county of decedent's residence at time of death.

Race/ethnicity: Hispanic includes all persons of Hispanic origin of any race, including Other and Unknown race. Multi-Race includes those of non-Hispanic origin who reported more than one race. The remaining groups are of non-Hispanic origin who reported a single race: American Indian or Alaska Native (AIAN), Asian, Black, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander (Pacific Islander), and White.

Sex: Sex of decedent is defined as either male or female. Excludes records with unknown and nonbinary sex.
