The California Department of Public Health (CDPH), Office of AIDS, considers undetectable = untransmittable (U=U) to be a powerful prevention tool in ending the HIV epidemic. It affirms that people with HIV can have healthy sexual relationships.

## U=U Facts:

- An undetectable viral load means that the level of HIV in a person's blood is so low that it cannot be detected by a lab test. Having an undetectable viral load is a vital part of staying healthy.
- A person with an undetectable viral load cannot sexually transmit HIV. Scientific studies including heterosexual and gay couples from 2008 -2018 have shown that there are no HIV transmissions when the partner with HIV is on medication with an undetectable viral load
- Although an undetectable viral load prevents HIV transmission, condoms are still important to protect against sexually transmitted infections and unintended pregnancy.



- People who are HIV negative can take PrEP to prevent HIV infection.
- Everyone living in California can access HIV prevention, care, and treatment services by asking a medical provider or by checking into the programs below.
