





A. Clue: We'll just give this one away—Near the intersection of two well-known rivers, the address is 611 North 7th Street.



B. Clue: Women's World Peace Concert on Armistice Day (November 11, 1921) was held at this breathtaking venue. The following year, "Symphonies Under the Stars" was born.




C. Clue: The Pinto, the Serrano, the Chemehuevi, and the Cahulla cultures inhabited this land. Today, the town boasts a retreat center designed by Frank Lloyd Wright and his son.




D. Clue: This place is mighty high—between 14,495-14,505 feet, depending on who you ask.




E. Clue: One town here was a Pony Express station in 1860. Another hosts a "leisurely" bicycle ride today which covers five passes for a distance of 129 miles over 15,000 feet of elevation gain.




F. Clue: The First and Second Sessions of CA Legislature convened here in a two-story adobe hotel, 60 by 40 feet, the upper story being assigned to the Assembly and the lower to the Senate.




G. Clue: In this area, founded in 1880's by Italian immigrants, you will find the tiny hamlets of Asti and Chianti. By 1905, locally produced wines won 10 gold medals at international competition.




H. Clue: This place has a Quivira Basin, an Enchanted Isle, and a Vacation Island.




I. Clue: "I have found it!"



J. Clue: This general area houses Consulate General of Finland, Embassy of Spain, Kuwait Consulate, Consulate General of Bangladesh, and Consulate General of France.



K. Clue: A doctor from Baltimore founded this town in 1840's. Being also a fur trader, he set up a ferry which exists to this day. Too bad the Doc was murdered in 1849 before realizing much profit from the ferry.



L. Clue: Native Americans and early settlers obtained salt from a spring-fed lake here, yards from the ocean. In 1948, a power plant took over the defunct salt manufacturing site.
