- The meeting was held by telephone conference call. A quorum of greater than 2/3 of Council members was present. The meeting was called to order at 1:30 P.M., on January 13, 2015.

- **Introductions.**

Council members, state staff, and guests introduced themselves.

- **State Report.**

Guey-Shiang Tsay, and Carrie Florez presented a report of the California SIDS activities of the Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health (MCAH) Division of the California Department of Public Health.

CDPH Personnel Updates: Dr. Ron Chapman will be leaving California Department of Public Health, and his last day in the job as the director and state health officer will be January 31, 2015. We greatly appreciate his support to our program.

The 2013 SIDS data have been analyzed and validated and are being prepared for approval to disseminate. The number of SIDS deaths in 2013, as well as the rate, decreased slightly from 2012. The number of deaths and rates for Undetermined and Accidental Suffocation and Strangulation in Bed increased from 2012. Combining all three causes of death to obtain the „SUID“ rate, there was an increase in 2013. The SIDS rate for African Americans remains higher than other racial/ethnic groups and was the only group to see an increase in 2013.

The annual „*SIDS Bulletin*“ will be updated and be expanded to include the three causes of death which make up SUID. It will no longer be called a „bulletin“ but will now be referred to as an „*Issue Brief*“.

A comprehensive analysis was done with the 2009 presumed SIDS cases we received. Data on location of death, sleep surface/bedsharing, and position when found, were included for cases if they were available. These data were then linked to the death file for cause of death and to identify any infants for which we did not receive any form of notification. All of these cases were then linked to the birth cohort file. This allows us to see if any changes in cause of death occurred and provides data on the mom's pregnancy and delivery. It was a laborious process but has since been made much easier, thanks to *Carrie Florez's* colleague *Jennifer Troyan*, we are planning to do this same analysis for additional years. Once complete, we hope to provide data to locals on unreported cases who most likely did not receive public health support.

Council members asked if these data would be released, specifically child care deaths. At this time the plan is to do additional years of analysis to be more up to date and then release results data on deaths which did not receive public health support. Because data on circumstances of infant death, location, etc. are not consistently received for all cases, the release of these data would likely not occur.

CDPH "Guidance for Local Health Jurisdiction and Communities Addressing Infant Safe Sleep Environments"


The *California Department of Public Health* website included a document entitled *Guidance for Local Health Jurisdictions and Communities Addressing Infant Safe Sleep Environments*. The California SIDS Advisory Council made a motion to the California Department of Public Health that the "Guidance for Local Health Jurisdictions and Communities Addressing Infant Safe Sleep Environments" be revised similarly or identical to Dr. Keens' suggested revisions, and a second document or curriculum be developed by the Council on how to work with individual families to promote safe infant sleep.

After considering the motions made by the Council along with the discussion at the October 2014 MCAH Action meeting, a decision was made to remove the "Guidance for Local Health Jurisdictions and Communities Addressing Infant Safe Sleep Environments" from the CDPH website and not modify the document. This document has been removed from the website.

MCAH does support the Council's recommendation to develop a document (brochure or handout) to provide guidance to SIDS Coordinators/Public Health Professionals and others in the field on how to work with individual families on parent-centered counseling and harm reduction to support safe infant sleep. MCAH encourages the Council to move forward in the development of this document and submit to CDPH for review and approval.

Support for Southern and Northern California Regional SIDS Councils.

The Southern and Northern California Regional SIDS Councils are our windows on the California SIDS community. Having the Presidents of these Councils present at Advisory Council meetings is crucially important. The agenda item regarding "Reimbursement of travel-related expenses for the Presidents of the Southern and Northern California Regional SIDS Councils to attend face-to-face CA SIDS Advisory Council Meeting" was already discussed and



responded by the MCAH Management at the previous Council's meeting on 10/16/2014. The Council urged continued exploration of this issue and ways to fund this.

- **California SIDS Program.**

Abbey Alkon, R.N., P.N.P., Ph.D., Program Director; and *Bobbie Rose, R.N., P.H.N.*, Nurse Educator; and *Mimi Wolff, M.S.W.*, Project Manager; reported on activities of the California SIDS Program as follows:

Presumed SIDS Deaths

- There have been 48 presumed SIDS cases reported to the CA SIDS Program from October 1, 2014 to December 31, 2014. There have been a total of 147 presumed SIDS cases reported from January 1, 2014-December 31, 2014.
- For this reporting period, the California SIDS Program has received 41 Coroner Notification Cards (CNC) and 40 PHSR forms.

Consultation, Technical Assistance, and Communication

Information, counseling and consultation were provided for 151 requests by phone and email. Most calls came from Public Health Nurses, SIDS Coordinators and MCAH Directors.

- Most of the requests came by email. Of the 151 requests, there were 120 email requests and 31 phone requests.
- After hours crisis counseling is available through the Contra Costa Crisis Center. To our knowledge, there have been no after-hour calls to the Contra Costa Crisis Center this quarter.
- The kinds of technical assistance requested are as follows from most common to least common: Conference and Training Information (45), SIDS Educational/SIDS Informational/Outreach Activities (34), Planning Activities (19), Consultation (15), Grief Support (6), Community Collaboration (5) and SIDS Advisory and Council Meetings (5), SIDS Public Health Services and Reporting Procedures (4).
- The California SIDS Program electronic newsletter was sent on December 3, 2014. The Newsletter was sent to the SIDS Advisory and Regional Councils and their associated mailing lists, SIDS Coordinators, MCAH Directors, Training attendees, and other interested parties who requested to be on the list. We receive regular requests to be added to the newsletter distribution list.

- **Trends in Infant Bedding Use: National Infant Sleep Position Study, 1993–2010:** This study examines how many infants sleep with potentially hazardous quilts, bean bags, blankets or pillows.

- **Sofas and Infant Mortality:** Data from 24 states in 2004-2012 for infant deaths on sofas were compared with data for sleep-related infant deaths in other locations. Deaths on sofas were associated with other risk factors for sudden infant death syndrome and sleep-related deaths. Researchers conclude that the sofa is an extremely hazardous sleep surface for infants. <http://pediatrics.aappublications.org/content/134/5/e1293.abstract>
- **Implementing Safe Sleep Practices in a Neonatal Intensive Care Unit:** A NICU Safe Sleep policy was revised to include AAP updated recommendations. Education and Information was shared with families and staff. Wearable blankets were provided and a safe sleep observation checklist was used. After education and reported observation, safe sleep compliance increased to 88%. <http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pubmed/25212974>
- **Tobacco Control Policies and Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS):** This paper looks at the effects of higher cigarette prices and smoke-free policies on the prevalence of SIDS. In this study of developed countries over a 20- year period, researchers found that higher cigarette prices were associated with reductions in the prevalence of SIDS. However, they found no evidence that smoke-free policies were associated with declines in SIDS.

- **Classification System for the Sudden Unexpected Infant Death Case Registry and its Applications:** Inconsistent investigation practices and no identifiable marker after autopsy can make it difficult to distinguish sudden infant death syndrome from other sudden unexpected infant deaths (SUID). The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, building on the work of other investigators, developed a classification system that could be used to identify gaps in investigations and better monitor the significance of specific types of SUID. This report describes the development and use of the classification.

Website:

- Website updates are submitted to MCAH from the California SIDS Program on the 15th of each month.
- The SIDS Advisory Council Minutes from the October 16, 2014 meeting have been posted.

- The SIDS Coordinator list on the California SIDS Program website is updated monthly.

- **Council's Role in SIDS Parent Support.**

Council discussed the issue regarding presumed SIDS parents not receiving public health nurse visits. Some Coroners are not referring babies to public health nurses if there is bedsharing and other risk factors.

- **Public Health Nurse Issues.**

Kitty Roche reported on the following public health nursing issues.

1. Update on Military cases not being reported.
 - a. *Kitty Roche* made contact with the Office of Decedent Affairs for the Navy, which serves both Navy and Marine Corps families at Balboa Naval Medical Center in San Diego. After a brief conversation, it was apparent that the knowledge level of the person she spoke to about SIDS, the California mandate and PHN follow-up available needed a more in depth conversation. This office does have “nurses” that visit families for perinatal deaths, including miscarriages, fetal demise and neo-natal death. A meeting has been scheduled for Wednesday, January 21, 2015, to define their services, our services, and next steps to get support for these families.
 - b. Since this service is uniform for all Navy hospitals, we need to find out what services are in place for both Air Force and Army hospitals.
2. There are continuing concerns from the SIDS Coordinators that some Coroner’s and Medical Examiners offices are not sending the referrals to PHNs because there are unsafe infant sleeping environments involved in the circumstances of the death. *Kitty Roche* and *Penny Stastny* both supported the SIDS Coordinators and suggested a number of possible mitigations.
 - a. Coordinators can increase their communication and relationship with these Coroners’ offices by meeting with them to explain the revision of the state mandate to include suspected SUDI, SUID and undetermined deaths. The Coordinators can encourage them to send referrals for all infant deaths and the Coordinators will decide if they meet the criteria.
 - b. Those who attend their Local Health Jurisdictions Child Death Review Team, can also approach that group for support in sending these referrals
 - c. This continues to be a barrier to services being given to grieving families, and any successes in this area that can be shared will be welcome.

- **First Responder/Coroner Investigator Issues.**

There was no discussion on this topic.

- **Southern California Regional SIDS Council.**

Penny F. Stastny, R.N., B.S.N., P.H.N., President of the Southern California SIDS Council, reported on the activities of the Southern California Regional SIDS Council.

The last meeting of the Southern California Regional SIDS Council was on November 13, 2014, at the Southern California Edison Company in Westminster, California. There have been changes in the management of the Southern California Edison facility, so it is not clear if we will be able to continue meeting there. The offices of the Guild for Infant Survival, Orange County, in Santa Ana, are potentially available to us for future meetings.

Jeri Wilson, who has served as Vice President of the Southern California Regional SIDS Council for 2-years, asked to step down from the Vice President role due to inability to make most meetings due to her work responsibilities. *Rachel Strickland* was elected to take her place as Vice President.

The Southern Council began discussion of the 34th Annual California SIDS Conference, which will be at the California Endowment Center in Los Angeles on Thursday, November 19, 2105. The theme of the conference will focus on SIDS research in the morning, and SIDS parents training public health nurses in the afternoon. The Council has tentatively planned the following. The Southern California Regional SIDS Council will continue to plan and fine tune the Conference agenda in its 2015 meetings.

A number of impressive community activities to improve SIDS services and education were reported by members of the Council, including:

- Los Angeles County (Luz Babcock): SIDS Awareness letters sent to 60 birthing hospitals and 300 perinatal service providers. Abstract presented at American Public Health Association meeting in New Orleans, November, 2014.
- Long Beach (Cynthia Brayboy): A number of safe infant sleep presentations to local hospitals.
- Guild for Infant Survival, San Diego (Michelle Herrera): Fundraising for SIDS research and support for SIDS families.
- County of Riverside (Deja Castro): Distributing Safe Infant Sleep videos to OB/GYN offices, and taught classes to local nursing students.
- Orange County (Karen Jackson): Participates in Child Death Review and educating PHNs on SIDS risk reduction.
- Children's Hospital Los Angeles (Tom Keens): Numerous SIDS education presentations, including one to Pediatric Residents at CHLA by SIDS parents, Rachel Strickland and Maureen Rubalcaba.
- Guild for Infant Survival Orange County (Penny Stastny): Offer parent support. Dinner with Doctor Keens was successful.
- New Normal SIDS Parent Support, Riverside County (Rachel Strickland): Continues SIDS support and participated in SIDS education sessions at CHLA and California SIDS Conference.

- Riverside County (Maureen Rubalcaba): Continues SIDS family support and presentations at junior colleges.
- Imperial County (Kitty Gay): Provides SIDS education to physician offices and WIC.

- **Northern California Regional SIDS Council.**

Susana Flores, P.H.N., President of the Northern California Regional SIDS Council, could not attend the meeting. Therefore, *Abbey Alkon* reported on activities of the *Northern California Regional SIDS Council*.

Natalie V. Berbick, MSW, is the new SIDS Coordinator in Contra Costa County. *Suzette Johnson* was thanked and congratulated for a job well done as she stepped down as SIDS Coordinator for Contra Costa County.

There has been interest in Peer Support training for parents. A few SIDS parents have called to inquire about the training and would like to attend future Peer Contact Training. The *California SIDS Program* will look into providing the training.



**Northern California Regional SIDS Council,
November 15, 2013.**

The Council discussed the 33rd *Annual California SIDS Conference* and reviewed the evaluation data. Ideas for what worked well and what could be improved were voiced.

Susana Flores was nominated for the second year as president and *Dawn Dailey* seconded the nomination. It was unanimous that *Susana Flores* will be President for the second year. *Susana* graciously accepted.

Susana reported about the SIDS Advisory Meeting on October 16, 2015.

A new SIDS Coordinator had a question about what should be reported for the “Community Reports” at the Regional SIDS Council Meetings. Guidelines would be helpful for new SIDS Coordinators who attend meetings. Suggestions for what to include in the guidelines were made and include: community resources, handouts, new issues and trends, products, obstacles to services, disparities, successes, strategies for home visits and perinatal services as related to SIDS. Reports can also include new ideas, resources for parents, and opportunities for SIDS education. In addition, the reports are a mechanism to generate information regarding systems issues so that recommendations can be made. It’s not necessary to include details about SIDS deaths, limit to the number of deaths and any unusual or noteworthy issues. The community

reports can also serve as a support system for public health professionals who provide services and an opportunity to build community. The council called for written guidelines to be submitted for review at the next meeting.

Community Reports: there were seven sleep related deaths in Alameda County, one sleep related death in San Francisco County, and no SIDS or SUID reported in San Mateo County. Alameda County Social Services Child Abuse Prevention unit is working on a Safe Sleep campaign. Children's Hospital Oakland and Highland Hospitals are included. *Aline Armstrong* will be presenting at the San Francisco Breastfeeding Coalition's Conference, *Creating Healthy Families: Breastfeeding and Child Development in the 21st Century*, to be held April 2-3, 2015, in San Francisco. San Mateo includes SIDS Risk Reduction in-services within parenting classes and reaches out the local 4C's and IHSD.

- **Future Council Meetings.**

The *California SIDS Advisory Council* holds four meetings per year. Three are by telephone conference call, and the fourth is in-person the day prior to the California SIDS Conference. The remaining Council meetings in 2015, are as follows:


