Karen Smith, MD, MPH

September 10, WELCOME

On March 23, 2015, Karen Smith, MD, MPH, was sworn in as director of the California Department of Public Health and state health officer. Smith is a physician specializing in infectious disease and public health. Prior to her appointment, Smith served as public health officer and deputy director at the Napa County Health and Human Services Agency since 2004. She has also been on medical staff for infectious disease at Queen of the Valley Medical Center in Napa since 2012 and has been a faculty consultant for the Francis J. Curry International Tuberculosis Center at the UC San Francisco since 1997.

She served as clinical faculty at the Santa Clara County Valley Medical Center Division of Infectious Diseases from 2001 to 2004 and from 1997 to 2000. Smith served as assistant section chief at the California Department of Health Services Tuberculosis Control Branch from 2000 to 2001 and held several positions at the Stanford University School of Medicine from 1992 to 2004, including resident, fellow and course director. Smith also served as TB Controller for Santa Clara County and has had a long history with the California TB Controllers Association, including serving a term as the organization's president.

She has served as a subject matter expert on Public Health Emergency Preparedness and is a liaison to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of the Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response. She also serves on the Board of Scientific Counselors of the CDC Office of Public Health Preparedness and Response.

Smith is a member of the National Association of County and City Health Officials, American Public Health Association, Infectious Diseases Society of America and the Napa County Medical Society.

Smith completed her medical training and infectious diseases fellowship at Stanford University after having obtained a Master of Public Health degree in International Health at Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health. Prior to her medical training, Smith worked in communicable disease control for the Peace Corp in Morocco and Thailand, and for a UCSF research project in Nepal.

Creating Sexually Healthy Communities: Applying the Social-Ecological Model to Teen Pregnancy Prevention

Environmental factors matter enormously in public health. Yet, too often we consider teen pregnancy and teen sexual health as individual conditions. This lively, informative and interactive keynote will address how individual behavior is actually a minor contributor to health outcomes when one considers the vast design and space issues at play in adolescent lives. There are great opportunities to work with partners and incorporate the social-ecological model into teen pregnancy prevention.

Sophie Godley joined the Boston University School of Public Health faculty as a Clinical Assistant Professor of Public Health in July of 2010. She teaches Introduction to Public Health for undergraduates and courses in the Maternal

and Child Health concentration, including Safer Sex in the City, From Science to Policy, and Women Children and Adolescents Public Health Approaches. Sophie has been working in the field of public health since 1993. Her areas of expertise include implementing science-based prevention programs and incorporating popular media into public health education. Sophie served as the deputy director of the AIDS Action Committee in Massachusetts for six years, overseeing prevention and education programs. She also served as director of the Office of Adolescent Health and Youth Development at the Massachusetts Department of Public Health from 1999 to 2004. In addition to her work at Boston University, Sophie serves as an evaluation consultant for Roca Inc., an innovative nonprofit where she works with high risk adolescent and young adult parents.

The Spirit of a Child: From Rejection to Connection to Direction

Gain an understanding that every child living under government care has a story of loss; a ruptured or severed connection to their families of origin. For those who have experienced multiple foster home placements, multiple stories of loss and or trauma exist. While loss can exist without trauma, trauma cannot occur without loss and therefore grieving. The community needs to acknowledge this grief and build in the structures to emotionally support youth.

Derek Clark's life is one of resilience and redemption. As a child he suffered unthinkable child abuse, abandonment and emotional distress before being turned over to the psychiatric hospital at age 5. His 13 years in the San Francisco Bay Area foster care system reflected an early life of aggression, emotional distress, overwhelming anxiety and being wrongfully labeled. The primary goal of this workshop is to enhance participants' understanding of the needs of LGBTQ youth and to explore ways in which we can grow our adolescent sexual health programs to better reach these youth. After completing this interactive workshop, participants will be able to define terms and concepts specific to LGBTQ populations, identify stressors and challenges for LGBTQ youth, and demonstrate strategies for working with LGBTQ youth.

■ ■ ■ **1B** *Creating a Culture of Consent*

Sexual violence and sexual violence prevention seem to be at the forefront of everyone's thoughts these days, and with good reason. From legislators to the media, and the community at large, there is great interest in the ways we can address and eliminate sexual violence. As members of society, and as educators committed to adolescent health, we also have a vested interest in this topic. In this workshop, we will examine the issue of sexual violence within the United States, with particular emphasis on sexual violence that impacts adolescents. We will use the social ecological model to explore risk and protective factors for sexual violence, as well as how our work can influence violence prevention at every level of the model. Lastly, we will look at ways in which we might change the way we teach healthy sexuality and consent, and how we can incorporate these strategies into the work we're already doing. This workshop will build on the experience of the attendees, involves high levels of participation, and will push all of us to think outside of the box to create a culture of consent.

■ ■ ■ **1C** *Approaches to Serving Especially Vulnerable Youth Part I: Young People in Challenging Situations*

Young people face numerous challenges as they strive to navigate through adolescence. This is especially true with young people who live in particularly complex situations, such as youth in the child welfare system, youth who live in rural areas, youth with special learning needs, and LGBT youth. Interventions serving these youth are often designed to influence behaviors by

working at the individual level (e.g., increasing knowledge and intention); however, the most successful interventions expand the focus from the individual level to include the familial, community, and social environments in which the adolescents live.

This two-part workshop will focus on youth who are especially vulnerable due to various influences on their lives and their behavior. Part 1 will help participants explore these influences and learn strategies that promote positive change. The session will prepare participants for Part 2, which will focus on techniques in working with youth with special learning needs.

This workshop will provide participants with insight into the complex interactions between the individual in various settings, their relationships, the community they belong to, and societal factors that impact their lives. Participants will have the opportunity to learn from each other's experiences as well as best practices in the field. They will explore how they could apply strategies to benefit youth in their programs and communities.

Today's adolescent is more exposed to sexual content through online channels than any previous generation. Mobile devices and social media make sharing information - accurate or not - nearly impossible to track. If better understood, social media can serve as a strong ally by pointing young people and their peers to trusted information where they can learn on their own. This workshop looks at the social media landscape and highlights the latest trends, trusted channels and resources educators can use to bring social media into the discussion.

This workshop offers an overview of the historical trends in drug treatment from the 1970's to the present with a focus on adolescents. The presenter offers a snapshot of the current demographics of youth drug use in the United States and California and how increases in pharmaceutical use among high school students has led to increases in heroin use in young adulthood. Attendees will learn how these trends are contributing to the overdose crisis in the U.S. and how the federal government is currently transitioning from promoting an abstinence-only treatment model to expanded evidence-based treatment that incorporates multiple strategies such as harm reduction, trauma-informed practice, behavioral health treatment and medication when appropriate.

However, this population is particularly vulnerable to negative sexual health outcomes and both need and deserve to be fully included and treated as sexual beings. In this interactive workshop, participants will discuss the joys as well as challenges of working with this special population. Staff from Health Connected will give an overview of some of the obstacles professionals might face working with adolescents with special learning needs. Examples of lessons from their published curricula will help participants as they collaborate to practice adapting a sexual health activity.




