

Family PACT

- Introduced in 1996 by Governor Wilson
- California's "Comprehensive Family Planning" Program
 - Family Planning and Reproductive Health Care for Low Income, Uninsured Women, Men and Teens
 - Family Planning Methods + Related Conditions + Education and Counseling
 - No Cost, Confidential Care
- Purpose: Increase Access to Promote Optimal Reproductive Health, Prevent Unintended Pregnancies and STIs/HIV.

Family PACT:

Program Highlights

- Provides comprehensive family planning services and related reproductive health care (including testing and treatment of STIs) at no cost to California residents
- Serves females and males under 200% FPL and with no other access to family planning services
- A network of about 2,400 public and private providers serves more than 1.7 million clients a year, including about 300,000 teens
- Federal financial reimbursement amounts to about 75% of family planning services annually; \$315 M in FY 06/07
- Average cost per client per year is \$261

Family PACT:

Reduce Traditional Barriers to Care

- Personal, Confidential, No Cost, FP/RH Services
- Minors Right to Self Consent for Pregnancy Related Services (California Family Code 6925)
- FP/RH care available and encouraged prior to start of intimate sexual activity
- On site client enrollment by health care provider
- Public clinics and private doctor's offices throughout State
- Call 1-866-FAM-PACT for Provider Referrals
- Availability of all family planning methods, as well as Emergency Contraception

Family PACT Cost-Benefit Ratio

Every dollar spent on Family PACT services* generates an estimated public savings of:


- \$2.76 up to 2 years after birth
- \$5.33 up to 5 years after birth


*Since most clients use a range of clinical services that are covered by Family PACT, not just contraceptives, the total cost of all services is included in the analysis including services for male as well as female clients.

Unmet Need for Publicly Funded Contraceptive Services in California by County, FY 2003-04

- There were 1.61 million women ages 15-44 in need of Publicly-funded Contraceptive Services.
- There were 461,000 adolescents and 1.15 million low-income adult women in need of publicly funded contraceptive services.

- 1998 TeenSMART Outreach Program (TSO)


Teen Pregnancy Prevention Programs

Distinguishing Features

- Comprehensive approach
 - School and community-based programs
 - Statewide media
 - Youth development, male-specific programs
 - Access to birth control
- Substantial investment
- Evaluation and training

- 1994 Battered Women Protection Act
- Approximately \$22 million
- Funding provided to 94 shelter-based domestic violence service providers

Battered Women Shelter Program

GRANTS

- Direct Services: Goal to protect battered women and their children against the ongoing infliction and threat of physical, sexual, and psychological abuse by past or present intimate partners.
- Prevention: Goal to reduce the incidence and prevalence of domestic violence in California.
- Unserved/Underserved: Goal to provide culturally and linguistically competent domestic violence services and prevention for ALL battered women and their children in California.

Unserved/Ununderserved Training and Technical Assistance Project

- 2005 Budget Act Appropriated \$1.1 million to address needs of Unserved/Underserved (for Domestic Violence services) Populations
- Targeted Activities for Special Populations Served by Domestic Violence Shelters
 - Mental Health and/or Substance Abuse Issues
 - Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Questioning Women; and
 - Disabled/Developmentally Disabled Women

Challenges

- Increased demand for family planning and reproductive health services
 - Number of women in their prime reproductive years (ages 15 – 44) will continue to increase steadily
- Federal Deficit Reduction Act
 - Proof of citizenship required
 - 1115 Family Planning Waivers are not exempt
- Uncertainty regarding renewal of current CMS 1115 Waiver for Family PACT
- Uncertainty regarding availability of Federal and State General Funds for Family PACT and Teen Pregnancy Prevention Programs
- The adolescent population is increasing, racial/ethnic diversity is increasing, and competition for resources is increasing.

Opportunities

- Limited funding will require targeted strategies/interventions to address the continued challenge of teen and unintended pregnancy
- Access to high-quality family planning reproductive health services can help prevent these outcomes
- Family PACT's confidential, comprehensive, no-cost services for teens as well as women and men represent an important investment in California's future
- Many opportunities still remain to serve greater numbers of women, men and teenagers throughout California
